## Leonardo da Vinci





This is an engraving from the 1850s by J. Pofselwhite of the master Italian Painter Leonardo da Vinci.

<u>Born</u>: April 15, 1452 <u>Died</u>: May 2, 1519 <u>Style</u>: High Renaissance


Leonardo was considered a true 'Renaissance Man', which meant that he pursued multiple fields of studies and was highly skilled. He was in fact, a master painter, sculptor, architect, musician, scientist, inventor, anatomist and engineer and botanist.

He is also famous for his notebooks full of sketches and designs for scientific and engineering projects. Curiously he wrote much of his notes backwards in "mirror writing". Perhaps he didn't want others to know about his scientific inventions!



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### The Last Supper



Leonardo drew extensive preliminary sketches and studies for this painting. Twenty survive today and are kept in the Royal Library at Windsor Castle in England.

<u>Date Completed</u>: 1494-1498 <u>Medium</u>: Oil pigments on gesso and resin <u>Dimensions</u>: 460 cm × 880 cm (181 in × 346 in) <u>Location</u>: Santa Maria delle Grazie , Milan, Italy

Leonardo was commissioned to paint this mural on the wall of the dining room of the former Dominican convent of Santa Maria delle Grazie in Milan.

Unfortunately, Leonardo used experimental painting techniques with this work and over time the surface has deteriorated greatly.

Thankfully, the building survived World War II bombings in 1943. The painting itself has been restored many times, most recently in 1999.

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#### The Virgin and Child with St. Anne

Completed: 1508 Medium: Oil on wood <u>Dimensions</u>: 168 cm × 112 cm (66 in × 44 in) Located: The Louvre, Paris, France

This painting was probably commissioned by Louis VII of France to give thanks for the birth of his only daughter in 1499. However, it was discovered in Leonardo's workshop in 1517, so it was never delivered. Leonardo was notorious for taking too long to finish paintings as he was usually working on many projects at the same time.

### Lady with an Ermine


<u>Completed</u>: around 1489–1490 <u>Medium</u>: Oil on walnut wood panel <u>Dimensions</u>: 54 cm × 39 cm (21 in × 15 in) <u>Located</u>: The National Museum, Kraków, Poland

<u>Completed</u>: 1490 –1496 <u>Medium</u>: Oil, tempera on panel <u>Dimensions</u>: 62 cm × 44 cm (24 in × 17 in) <u>Located</u>: The Louvre Abu Dhabi, United Arab Emirates <u>Studyladder</u>



### Mona Lisa (La Gioconda)

Completed: about 1503–1519 <u>Medium</u>: Oil on Poplar (wood) <u>Dimensions</u>: 77 cm  $\times$  53 cm (30 in  $\times$  21 in) Located: The Louvre, Paris, France

It is thought to be a portrait of Lisa Gherardini, wife of a Florentine cloth merchant named Francesco del Giocondo. She is a very graceful figure, with the hint of a smile, painted in front of a misty atmospheric backdrop.

This is another example of a portrait that was never completely finished by Leonardo da Vinci. But this does not detract from her mysterious beauty!



This is undoubtedly Leonardo's most famous painting.
