The hippopotamus is the third largest living land mammal after the elephant and rhinoceros. "Hippo" comes from an ancient Greek word meaning "river horse'. Hippos have very thick smooth skin and are nearly hairless. Hippos are semi-aquatic, which means they live on land and in water. They spend the day in rivers, lakes and swamps, but emerge at dusk to graze on grass. Hippos are one of the most dangerous animals in Africa. They can outrun a human on land and their long sharp canine teeth or tusks can bite a boat in half. Hippos can stay under water for up to 6 minutes.




Gestures

3. 10 hippos were resting in the sun. 4 more hippos joined them.


