## Volcano Facts


- The name 'volcano' comes from the Roman god of fire, Vulcan.
- Over half of the world's volcanoes arise in a belt around the Pacific Ocean called the Ring of Fire.
- Hot liquid rock under the Earth's surface is known as magma. It is called lava after it comes out of a volcano.
- Volcanic eruptions can send ash over 30 km high into the air.
- Pumice is a unique volcanic rock that can float in water.
- The loudest known sound in the history of humanity was caused by the volcanic eruption at Krakatoa, near Java in 1883.

Can scientists predict when volcanoes will erupt?


Research volcanic eruptions and write a short report. Give details outlining the devastation of one particular eruption.
