<u>Died</u>: May 17, 1510

Style: Early Renaissance

Botticelli was an Italian painter of the Early Renaissance and one of the first to paint large scale mythology themed pieces of work.

He was commissioned to paint fresco murals on the walls of the Sistine Chapel and was a sought after portrait painter.

His style was individual and graceful using line to add detail to his paintings.

The name Botticelli was a childhood nickname which means "Little Barrel".

Botticelli portrayed four members of the powerful Medici Family in this painting as well as what is though to be a self portrait of himself (in the yellow robe on the far right).



Primavera (Allegory of Spring)

<u>Located</u>: The Uffizi Gallery, Florence, Italy

This colossal painting features mythological characters in an orange grove. The central figure is Venus, the goddess of love. The figure covered in flowers is Flora, the goddess of flowers and Spring.

The name of the man in this painting is not known but he is holding a medal of Cosimo Medici.

The Medici Family ruled the city of Florence during the Renaissance. They were merchants and bankers and were very rich and powerful. They were great supporters of the arts and commissioned Botticelli to paint many pieces of work for them.
